Recent History:

Process: In 2020 voters approved a constitutional amendment creating an independent redistricting commission of citizens and legislators to draw congressional districts. The bipartisan commission failed to agree on new maps. Their deadlock transferred map-drawing power to the state Supreme Court.

Finalization of current map: The Supreme Court of Va. appointed special masters who finalized the 11 districts on December 28, 2021. These maps took effect for the 2022 elections and are scheduled to be used until 2031, following the 2030 Census.

Impact: The new maps altered district boundaries across the state to meet population requirements, impacting some incumbent locations and political representation. Virginia currently has an 11-member U.S. House delegation — 6 Democrats and 5 Republicans.

If the amendment passes the districts will be redrawn to favor 10 Democrats and 1 Republican.

Summary of Democrat and Republican positions on the proposed amendment:

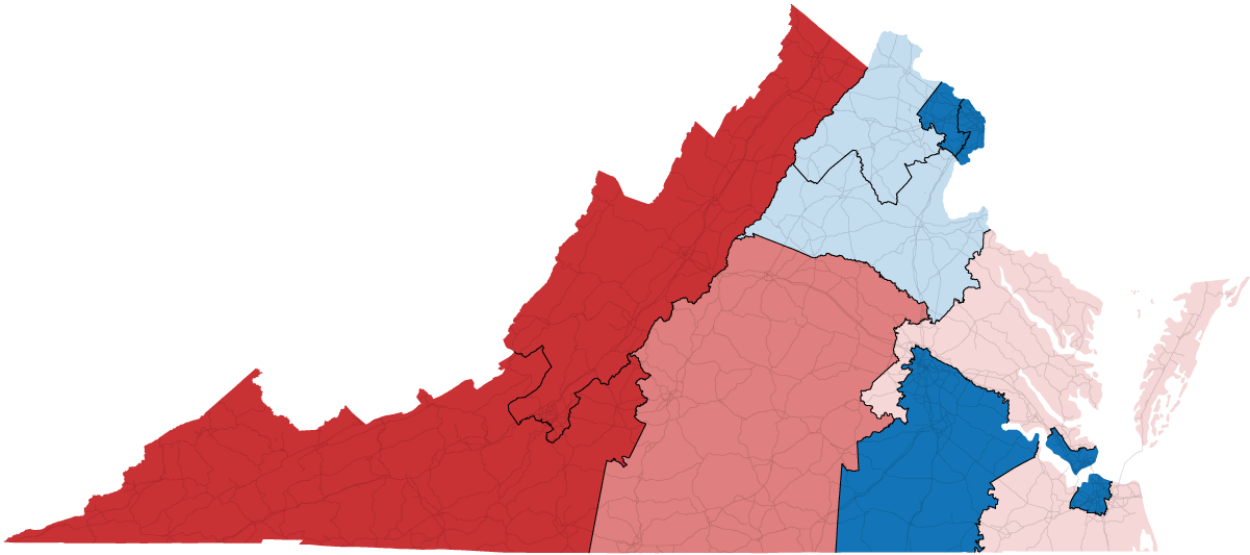
Democrat:

- To have more Democrat safe seats in the state to counterbalance what Republicans did in Texas, Florida and North Carolina. “The measure is needed to counter GOP-led map changes in other states.”
- This is needed to counter the trend Virginia Democrats say threatens to weaken the commonwealth’s leverage and representation in Congress.
- Senate Majority Leader Scott Surovell, D-Fairfax, said “Virginia was confronting a reality voters could not have predicted when they approved the redistricting reform five years ago.” He warned that states such as Texas and Missouri were now using mid-cycle redistricting to lock in power, while Virginia remains “unable to fight with one hand tied behind its back.”
- Sen. Schuyler VanValkenburg, D-Henrico, said the amendment was a proportional response to “opportunistic, mid-decade redistricting” now being encouraged by the Trump-Vance administration.”
- Virginia Democrats believe they have to “fight fire by fire” in order to counter any gains made by Republicans in Texas.
- House of Delegates Speaker Don Scott called it “leveling the playing field across the country.
- The independent commission proved not independent enough resulting in the Supreme Court making the final decision.

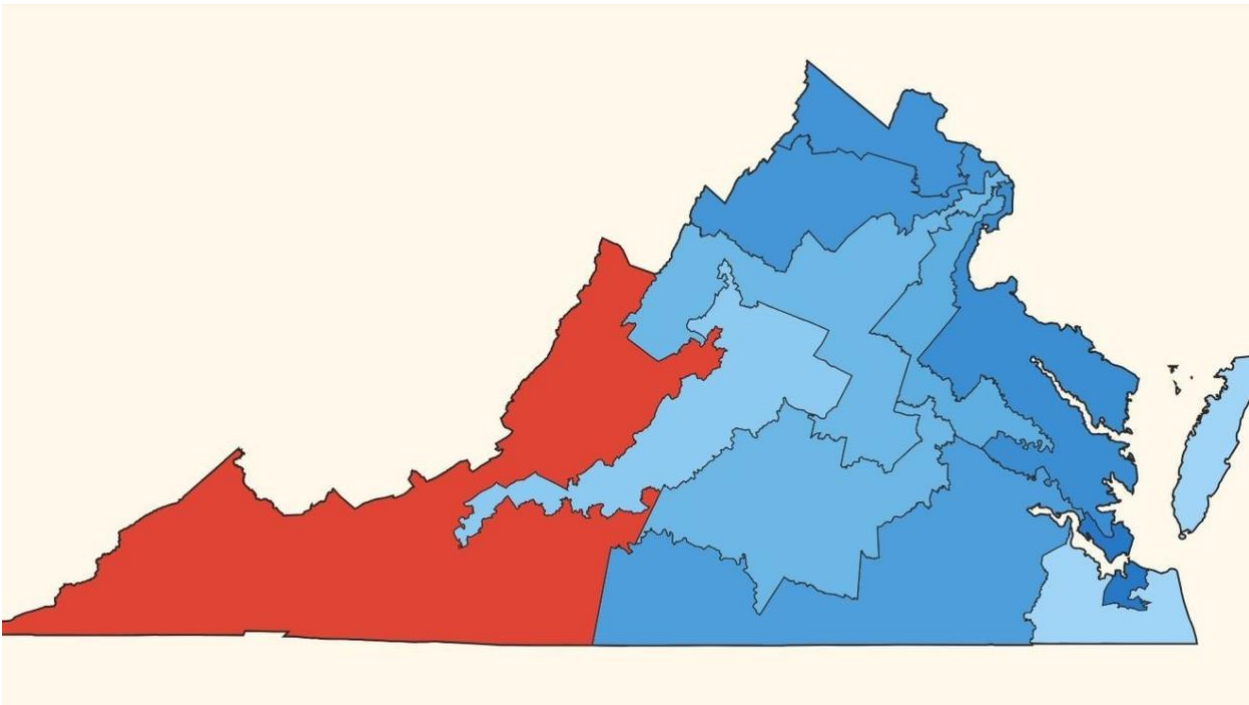
Republican:

- These new lines violate both the law and common sense that states that districts should be as compact as possible geographically and include “communities” of interest.
- It splits Northern Virginia into five districts, not to preserve communities of interest, but to manufacture advantage. It stretches regions that share little in common socially or economically, all to achieve a predetermined partisan outcome.
- Gov. Glenn Youngkin blasted the vote in a statement, calling the entire process “shameful, fundamentally wrong, and illegal.”
- Virginia voters settled the redistricting question in 2020. Nearly two-thirds of Virginians amended our Constitution to create an independent redistricting commission and take map-drawing power away from politicians. The message was unmistakable: stop the gerrymander. Stop letting politicians choose their voters.
- The amendment reverses voter-approved redistricting commission decisions modified by the Supreme Court.
- Sen. Glen Sturtevant, R-Chesterfield, called it “a violation of the public’s trust,” pointing to the amendment’s release date just days before the election after 1 million Virginians had already voted last fall.
- Sen. Danny Diggs, R-York, argued the proposal represented a shift away from fair representation and toward national partisan strategy.
- Democrats applauded the initial independent commission reform. Democrat House of Delegates Speaker Don Scott praised fairness and transparency. Democrat Senate President pro tempore L. Louise Lucas declared it would ensure “an equitable, transparent and bipartisan process to ensure our electoral maps are drawn fairly.” Democrat Rep. Don Beyer said plainly, “Gerrymandering is cheating. It allows politicians to select their voters, when it should be the other way around.” They are now changing their tune because of hatred for Donald Trump.
- In 2019, [Abigail Spanberger](#) said, “Gerrymandering is detrimental to our democracy. Opposing gerrymandering should be a bipartisan priority.” While running for governor, she added, “Short answer is no. I have no plans to redistrict Virginia.”
- This is not about communities of interest, compact districts, or neutrality. It is about national partisan math.
- Democrats condemn gerrymandering nationally and celebrate it locally.
